


Athenian Democracy Notes: Page 99 ISN

First Stirring of Democracy: Athens

Reformers wished to stop the abuse of power and replace the <u>oligarchy</u> with a <u>democracy</u>.



Major Athenian Reformer #1: <u>Solon</u>



Solon (cont.)

Ended slavery for debtors

Granted citizens right to vote

Voters in Ancient Athens Included:

Adult males over the age of 18 who had Athenian parents.

12% of its citizens

Major Athenian Reformer #2: <u>Pericles</u>

A general and a statesman

Set up salaries for public gov't officials

Athens became 1st <u>direct democracy</u>


Famous for a speech he gave called "The Funeral Oration" in 431 BC

Citizens take part in the day-today affairs of government.

Today, most democratic countries, people elect representation.

Citizens Assembly: Debated laws and important decisions



Council of 500

Chosen at random

debated important decisions and negotiated with foreign states

Dikasteria

People's Court (6000 jurors) Random selection judged those who violated laws

Magistrates (9) Elected by Ecclesia Applied laws
